

The Sword Is Sharper Than The Pen

- Words from the Knight Marshal -

To date we have no fighter practice venue, so no fighter practices, no weapon inspections and no fighter training.

I have finished most of the work on the replica Norse centergrip shield, applying rawhide strips to the edge and painting the canvas front in a charming red and black maelstrom. This shield will be used for fighter practices and to stand as a reasonable example of a shield of the period for others to copy. The shield is 32" in diameter, constructed of 1/2" thick clear pine boards glued edge to edge, covered on the front in light canvas glued with milk glue, or rather it's modern equivalent: "wood glue". The rawhide for the edge was obtained by soaking long rawhide dog chews in hot water, unrolled, flattened and then cut into 2" strips. The rawhide is then clamped at one end, stretched down the edge and clamped along it's length. Strips overlap approximately 1" and are glued down upon drying. I plan to drill holes through the overlap and sew sinew through the holes to firmly attach those points. Some period shields show holes running along the full length of the rawhide and once I am able to test the sinew I will decide if I want to sew completely around the shield. I have some concern that drilling holes will weaken the edge. A leather strap is attached in this example slightly to the left of the Hand grip to facilitate threading it under the boss, over the back of the hand. This attachment system has been shown to greatly increase control of the shield when held at arms length and helps lessen the chance of losing the shield in combat.

We have been in contact with other reenactment/fighting groups to invite them to the Thyng and I have been studying their techniques and rules online to help me understand what they will be doing in July. I am also collecting URLs of interesting videos, images and blogs concerning history, reenactment and armed combat of the period to include in an augmented version of the Marshals Handbook. The handbook is in PDF format and I have installed it on a device with a PDF viewer, which I hope will enable easy viewing at the Thyng for quick reference. I plan to add images of weapons and armor as mentioned in the text so that future marshals and fighters will easily understand the text, which is currently without illustrations.

We are finalizing some details of the fighting fields and having discussions on the layout of the fighting fields and physical nature of barriers and other equipment such as the "ships" for sea battles, the "fleeing monk" and the "castle" from which the king and men must flee in the Hnefetafl Battle, also known as the

Burning House. The Deputy Seneschal has been the primary architect of these details due to his great experience and willingness.

I have been studying the problem of period correct footwear for fighters. Most modern fighters feel the need for hard soled boots in combat for foot protection and I am attempting to find a pattern which will remove the need for modern boots as they detract from the authenticity of the field and generally annoy me as much as blue plastic armor, but that is a personal prejudice and will not be a requirement of the fighters. To date modern boots are acceptable gear as is blue plastic armor. My hope is to supply fighters with better looking and effective alternative to modern materials.

Winter has brought some problems in outdoor work and some minor health issues due to my feeble frame (fibromyalgia and arthritis) but as the weather warms I will be clearing areas on our property as an alternative to fighter practice locations otherwise used such as public parks. You can't have too many fields to fight in.

Wurst is Best or Why Hot Dogs are Period - By Hrotger

"Mix and knead together all the state business as you do for your sausages. To win the people, always cook them some savoury that pleases them."

From Knights (424 BCE) by Aristophanes

Due to a combination of efficient butchery and a need to preserve meat, sausage has been an important item in man's diet for at least twenty centuries. Akkadian stone tablets housed at Yale University dating to 1700 BCE were revealed by the French scholar Jean Bottero to be the oldest extant recipe books. They included a text describing meat-stuffed intestinal casings (the world's first sausages). Of course, sausages also show up in other early texts; Homer mentions a kind of blood sausage in the Odyssey, Epicharmus wrote a comedy titled "The Orya" (The Sausage) in the 5th century, a 6th century Chinese agricultural manual contains instructions for making sausages, and the opening quote comes from a play by Aristophanes' about a sausage vendor who is elected leader of the state.

Not to be outdone, sausage on a stick was a favorite food of the Romans, becoming so popular during the Lupercalia Festival that the early church banned their consumption. In the 10th century, Byzantine Empire, Leo VI outlawed the production of blood sausages following an outbreak of food poisoning (possibly the oldest food law, ignoring religious prohibitions).

Although the origin of sausages is to be found in the classical

period, if not earlier, it was during the Middle Ages that sausage-making abounded. The daily consumption of fresh meat began to decline as the population in Europe recovered from the Black Death, and, as a result, more land was devoted to labor-intensive agriculture rather than stock rearing. As fresh meat consumption declined, the salting and preserving of meat grew, often taking the form of sausages, and the local sausage peddler in towns was a familiar character. A document from the Spanish vice-regent in Palermo on January 30, 1415 shows that lamb, pork, or sausages were bought thirteen days out of the month and macaroni only once a month. The sausages were usually purchased from street vendors and eaten for dinner.

Traditionally, sausage makers would salt various tissues and scraps such as organ meat, blood, and fat then stuff them into tubular casings made from the cleaned intestines of the animal. This process help use every consumable part of the animal and aided in preserving the meat as well. In fact the very name "sausage" is derived from the Old French "saussiche" which comes from the Latin word "salsus" meaning salted.

Different regions produced their own distinctive types of sausage, both fresh and dry, based upon the availability of ingredients as well as the climate. In areas with periods of cold climate, sausages could be kept fresh during the cold months, and smoked or cured to keep fresh during the warm months. In hotter climates, dry sausages were developed that kept fresh for extended periods.

Eventually, these regional styles of sausage, created through necessity, became associated with the area in which they originated. For example bologna originated in the town of Bologna in Northern Italy, Lyons sausage from Lyons in France, and berliner sausage from Berlin in Germany. The best known and most beloved of sausages in our modern world was created in 1562 for the feast at the coronation of Maximilians II. This sausage, a type of bratwurst, eventually came to be named after the town it was created in. Where was that you ask? Well, it was in Frankfurt that the Frankfurter (or hot dog) was born..

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HOLDING THE LINE

(The mostly true events of a Northern Region War Practice)

War was coming. There was no stopping that now. The Kingdom of the East and the Kingdom of the Middle had walked away from peace and set a battle field between them.

It was my first summer in the Northern Army, and I feared it might be my last.

The warriors that carried the white star had a reputation as thugs- burly men and women who put killing the enemy ahead of saving their own skin. To die a glorious death wasn't just better than retreating, it was expected. But reputation isn't built on a moment's glory. The ranks of the Northern Army were full of gray hair and determination, skill coupled with a taste for war that saw fighters line up year after year to defend their lands long after glory and riches would have given them the comfort of a noble's life.

This was just a practice, I told myself, a time to teach us the maneuvers that would win us the war to come. No one here was going to die today. Probably.

It was brutally hot. The sun shone through a smokey haze that lay like a blanket over the field. All around, people wore the red faces that spoke of sun fever and we hadn't begun to fight yet. I settled into my sweat, at least my cooking duties had prepared me to deal with the heat.

We lined up in our groups, ours holding the left end of the line. I stood with members from my village, nothing more than an outpost in the Northern Region, and within that, I stood with Harald and his sons, Asulf, Ragnar, and Olaf. And then there was me, just a runaway from my father's cattle farm, knowing nothing of war but wanting little of the shame we would face in defeat.

Across from us was the other half of the Northern Army, ready to demolish us. To demolish me. There were scores of them and me with a large white shield- a perfect target coupled with an unsteady sword. There was nothing left to swallow in my dry throat as I faced a mock death. My place would be exposed as a weakness, the spearman behind me defenseless when I fell.

"They think they're invincible," Olaf said, nodding his head to the white tabards across from us. "Don't let their pretty armor fool you, they're human like everyone else here."

"Speak for yourself," Kveldulf said. He was a short man, a love of ale giving him a round gut that he passed off as mythical dwarven heritage. His board ax flashed on his shoulder.

"We'd be a lot better off if your arm were as quick as your tongue," Olaf said.

"Don't be jealous. Your bark is almost as bad as your bite, little dog."

Olaf's face reddened, but not from the heat and they pretended to kill each other in a brotherly show of northern love.

"Save it!" Harald stopped them as he walked our part of the line, making sure we were where he wanted us. "Keep the line. That is your job. Keep it straight, keep it strong. If they're going to break through anywhere, it better not be here." He stopped in front of me, he was a bear of a man, and his presence in our line alone might be enough to strike fear into the enemy we faced. "When they push, you push back with everything you have. I know you can do this."

I nodded, but I still wasn't sure how I could push against all those people.

"Hey," there was a tap on my shield and I looked over to see Olaf grinning. "Protect your brother on your left."

"Protect your brother on your left." I repeated his words, realizing he was the brother on my left. And that is when the wall became a wall for me. I was not one person defending one place against dozens of individuals. I was part of a line fighting another line. It wasn't one verses one hundred. It was one hundred verses one hundred.

I looked to the brother on my left and passed Olaf's wisdom down the line.

At the command, we marched, foot over foot at a measured pace. But soon, both lines began to falter and bend as people slowed in fear, or hastened in eagerness. Our part remained straight and strong, Harald's words keeping discipline long after he said them. My feet set to match only the brother on my left as Olaf kept to mine.

We were steps away when the spears behind us lowered and we lifted our shields into position. Another step and we locked eyes with the person we would shove against. One more and the last breath of peace sat between opposing lines of shields.

The crash of metal and wood split the heavy air followed by a chorus of grunts and the ring of spears against helms. I pushed the shield in front of me, underestimated for both my size and my sex, I gained ground. I dug in my feet, hunkering down behind my shield to give the spear behind me room to kill.

The line disintegrated into pockets of blades and boards as we walked among our fallen comrades. Somehow, I had managed to survive the initial onslaught to face an 'invincible' youth in a white tabbed. His blade flashed to my helmet, giving nothing more than a pleasant ting. Grinning, I shook my head while his eyes widened. I stepped into his defense like it belonged to me, almost pinning his toes under my boots as I fired shot after shot until something stuck. Behind him was man in a red belt. That was all I saw before he cracked the side of my helmet hard enough to give me the death I deserved.

We lined up again. The heat weakening arms and stealing breath as churgeons dragged Northern fighters from the field. "What good will it do us if you die here?" they said to armored temper tantrums. "Save your fire for the war."

Our numbers began to dwindle, until those taken from the ranks were greater than those who remained.

Our business meetings are now being held back at Crandall Library earlier in the afternoon on the second Sunday of the month. I say back because once upon a time the shire used to use the library as their meeting spot, so the necessity of moving here due to the Red Cross building being sold was really no great hardship. In fact, meeting at the library earlier in the day has great deal more potential for attracting the interest of a casual passer by then we would have ever had at the Red Cross.

The new year brought the return of the event season with Birka as always being the unofficial kick off. Tomas journeyed into the far eastern reaches of the kingdom to do some shopping, hear the news, and discover what the final word would be on the kingdoms new proposed "royalty" structure. The proposal was and will be a kind of booking fee to have a royal progress at your event. This fee will be 20% of the profit generated by the event. Planning for our major event, The Great Northern Thyng continues. In the interest in inclusivity and cross-play opportunities, shire members including myself, Tomas, Will, and Sam attended the inaugural event for a new Amtgard (LARP / Battle Game) group in our area. All had a grand time and it was noted that the similarities of our hobbies should allow for cross-game integration at the Thyng with very little difficulty. Also in preparation for the Thyng, personal invitations in the form of a scroll done with calligraphy and illumination have been being prepared and either presented in person or mailed to various groups. I presented one such invitation in person to Markland. Another is being mailed to the herald of the Kingdom of Acre. Tomas will be presenting one to our friends in the Shire of Mountain Freehold and more will be going out prior to Thyng.

The warm weather has of course also brought new Demo opportunities, several of which will be occurring in Salem thanks to the hard work of our Chatelaine Colleen. In addition to those, we have been invited to hold some A&S activities out there as well. We had not been having an regular group A&S activities for various reasons but the new year has brought a renewed interest in the arts and sciences. In fact, the multi-class day that had been in the planning stages sense last December has finally found a location and will be occurring at the end of the month. The location, the Moreau Community Center is very welcoming and may prove to be useful for a monthly meeting space.

GETTING STARTED

When traveling to my godmother's funeral in CT back in 2013, I ran into a childhood friend, Tim, her nephew. At the social after the service, Tim told me about this thing he was doing the next week, going to a place called "Pennsic." I asked him what that was, and he gave me a brief description but told me to go look it up when I got home. I did.

What I found fascinated me. I was an avid reader of historical romances and a lover of the Elizabethan period. The stories of knights, royalty, chivalry, and even the mundane running of family households were what my dreams were about. The more I read, the more I wanted to learn.

I found out that there were local people doing the same stuff that I had always wanted to learn and wished I could live. So, I showed up at Hunter's Moon with my daughter. I had no idea what to do. After checking in at gate, I said we were new. The guy waved me over to 3 bins of garb I could go through and pick from.

After finding something suitable for me and my daughter to wear, we wandered over to the A&S pavilion. There I met Sabd, and she invited me to go to a Glenn Linn meeting the next week. I showed up there and felt really out of place. But Sabd was there to be my friend, and she guided me as I found my footing.

There was discussion about NRWC the next year, and Gage said there weren't any bids for an autocrat. I gathered from the conversation that an autocrat is the person in charge of the event. But what the heck was a War Camp? I figured it was kinda like this "Pennsic" thing that Tim had told me about.

SERVICE FROM THE START

Since no one else was offering to be autocrat, Sabd reluctantly took the job at the October meeting. Because she was so helpful and friendly towards me, I didn't want to let my new friend have to do all this work that she really didn't want to do. I offered to help her.

As her deputy, and to relieve her of a lot of the pressure of organizing, I took it upon myself to do most of the legwork. Sabd dealt with the Town of Warrensburg and Warren County (NRWC was to be in Warrensburg at the Warren County Fairgrounds, as it had been for years).

After learning what kinds of things go on at NRWC, and finding out there was no record of what had been done in years

past, I researched the most cost-effective places to get the things we needed. First things first, and that was porta potties. I learned there was a building with toilets centrally located, but I figured there needed to be a few extra places for people to go.

After speaking with a few companies, I chose a vendor and contacted them to reserve the porta potties. Next, I learned we had to collect and remove trash from the site. So I found a vendor for that and arranged a dumpster. Since I'm not in the business of knowing all about dumpsters and trash collecting, I had no idea what size to get. I wound up getting one too big, but figured this was a learning experience.

I HAVE TO BUILD A CASTLE?

Along the way, I learned that the fighters needed to build "castles" and "bridges" so they could practice their fighting. In my mind, I imagined a real castle and a real bridge, just like in the olden times. No, that's not it. The castle and bridge would be built out of bales of hay or straw. Really? I wondered, just how big are these structures going to be, anyway? No, not a real bridge and a real castle with doorways and such. Just a basic footprint so the fighters could pretend it's there was a bridge and a castle. I still didn't understand, but what the heck. My job was to just get the stuff. I didn't have to know the logistics of how it was to be used.

First, I had to find out the difference between straw and hay. Then I had to price them both. I was surprised to learn that hay is quite a bit less expensive than straw. Again, I found a vendor and arranged to have 100 bales of hay delivered to the site.

Since no one had bothered to keep notes about where to get all this stuff, I decided to start a list to make it easier for the person in charge the next year. I'm glad I did, since that person would be me.

PERMITS AND PROBLEMS

Sabd told me horror stories of the frustration in getting permits from the town and county. Getting archery and thrown weapons included in NRWC that year was impossible. Tomas and Erik, especially, were upset with this, but there was nothing that could be done about it.

I had everything set by winter of 2014, so all I could do was sit back and wait.

At the June business meeting, I requested checks to pay for the hay and porta-potties, as payment was expected on delivery. I had to reserve the dumpster with my own credit card, so I was happy to get the reimbursement check.

Finally, the event was getting close. We were to set up the site that week. Sabd and I went to Warrensburg to get the keys to the gates and to the restrooms. I had heard that the autocrat or the deputy had to be on site the entire time. Sabd did not want to camp, so I had gone out and bought a 4-person nylon tent and



air mattress. I offered to stay on site from beginning to end. I became The Keeper of the Keys.

FIRST ON, LAST OFF

On Thursday, the first day of NRWC, I arrived on site at 7am to unlock the gates. I wasn't sure what time the hay would be delivered, and since I had the check for them, I had to be there. I'm glad I arrived early, because it was delivered at 7:30.

The porta-potties and dumpster soon followed, so I told the men where to place them. Finally, other shire people started to arrive. Someone from the town came and described how to work the lights, showed me where the toilet paper, trash can liners, broom, and mop were. We were responsible for cleaning the bathrooms, keeping them stocked, and disposing of the hay when we were finished.

It hadn't been easy to find people to volunteer to work gate. Since we are a small shire, everyone already had jobs to do just to run the event. As deputy, I sat at gate a lot along with Sabd during the day. She was unable to do much else. Because she was unable to in some way, or because she was stuck at gate? Maybe add sentence that shows her continued friendship or contribution?

I was occasionally able to leave gate to check and restock the bathrooms for supplies (Why wasn't I shown how to refill the paper towel dispenser? I must have struggled with that thing for half an hour or more) or to be sure the hose was hooked up and running for the fighters to cool off. I even got to walk around the site and see a few merchants, watch the fighters for a bit (So THAT's what the hay is used for), and chat with my friend Tim for a bit. He introduced me to a few of his friends. I even got to go to Court for the first time. And I met the King (Brennan I)!

I hadn't camped in a tent since I was a child. I really had no idea what I was doing. Since I needed to use electric for my CPAP device I brought a heating element so I could cook. I knew nothing about making a fire or cooking over one.

That first night, it was the pits. It had started to rain and the temperature dropped like a stone. My nylon tent did nothing to keep the cold out, and I was freezing on the air mattress. No one told me that an air mattress directly on the ground just sucks your body heat away from you. Even fully clothed, in a sleeping bag, with my blanket and wool cloak on top did nothing to keep me warm. I remembered from when I was a kid not to touch the inside of the tent so the rain wouldn't seep in, but that didn't help with the damp cold. Needless to say, I didn't sleep much that night. The following night wasn't much better.

The rest of the event went off pretty well, but cleaning up afterwards was no fun. It took two people almost four hours to industrially clean the bathrooms. Picking everything up after almost everyone left took a long time as well. By Sunday afternoon at 3pm, I was bushed. But I stayed to the bitter end. I was first

on and last off the property. Not bad for a deputy autocrat of a major event 11 months after first hearing about Pennsic.

A NEW SITE, A NEW PLAN

At the event meeting the next week, Sabd and I gave the final report of the event and took care of last-minute financial things. I decided I actually had fun with this whole NRWC thing and I wanted to do it the next year.

People mentioned to me that the site was getting too small for NRWC. It had grown so much that we needed a bigger space, one that allowed archery and thrown weapons. So I began to look around. A couple people suggested I check out the Washington County Fairgrounds site.

Fair enough. Since it was my first time being autocrat, I figured we might as well start at a new place. As Sabd's deputy, I noticed some things that needed improvement, a new site could allow for better set up.

I spoke with Mark, the manager, at the fairgrounds. I explained our needs and he was more than willing to accommodate us. He was a gem to work with the three years I served as autocrat.

It turned out that the fairground personnel would take care of the bathrooms so we didn't have to spend all that time caring for them then cleaning them up. They also would provide trash pick-up, so we didn't have to rent a dumpster. A bonus was not having to dispose of the hay bales when we were done. They provided us with a compost dumpster, so all we had to do was load it up with hay bales.

Planning NRWC at the new site was fun. No one had any expectations about where things happen, so I was free to decide all that. I had my contacts for the hay and the porta potties, so that was easy. Good thing I kept notes the previous year. I added to those notes with info about the new site. I also decided to manage the event differently than how it was managed before.

For NRWC of 2014, Sabd maintained control over setting up classes, merchants, dealing with the Royals, getting gate volunteers, and site management. I kept her abreast of what I was doing, too. But I could see how much pressure that put on her, and I didn't want that.

I developed a new way of managing NRWC. No longer would the autocrat be responsible for all the legwork. I would still oversee everything, but I was going to spread the joy of the planning process.

Erik became Merchant-o-crat and site coordinator, Æsa was in charge of planning everything to do with fencing, Tomás did archery and was Ice-o-crat (the shire fundraiser at NRWC), and Gage was royal liaison (with a bit of help from Liam). Eikaterine was youth marshal. I found a heavy list marshal, a thrown weapons marshal, and an equestrian marshal to handle planning those things. Sandie planned classes and lined up teachers. And I was



in charge of getting volunteers for gate, providing loaner garb, and coordinating with the fairgrounds manager.

Just so everyone was kept abreast of what was going on with planning War Camp, I held meetings throughout the year. I wanted everyone to have input in planning and taking ownership of the shire event. It worked out well. The three NRWCs that have been held at the new site have gotten easier to plan every year. People know their jobs now, so that helps a lot.

It's still a struggle to find gate volunteers, and it's even harder now with the new kingdom rules added to our shire rules. There must be two blue-card-carrying, non-related adults who do not live in the same mundane household at gate at all times. In addition, since all active members of the shire are busy working the event, they do not have a lot of time to work two-hour shifts at gate.

The second year we were at the new site, we had a bit of unexpected weather to deal with. A Category E0 tornado blew by,

within a couple miles of the site. I spread the word to let people know we were sheltering in the Ag Center building.

In the Ag Center, we stood in the doorway and watched the funnel go slowly past in the distance. When it was all clear, we went to check on camps. There were many tents down and things were waterlogged. In our camp, my tent was the only one still standing. People pulled together and got things cleaned up over the next few hours.

The threat of the storm dropped attendance, but I am proud to say that for the three years I was autocrat of NRWC, the shire pulled a profit. The third year was best, about \$3,000. It was a welcome addition to our bank account as the following year, we were honored when the East Kingdom hosted their 50th anniversary celebration in our shire on the same weekend.

I've since passed the reins to the Hrotger to take charge of our summer event. I can't wait to see what he's cooked up!



A Walk on the Wild Side

Dandelions: This plant is native to Eurasia and was brought to America by settlers. Chiffolo tells us that the greens have been eaten in the Mediterranean since ancient times and could likely be one of the original bitter herbs of Pass-over.

Known in many countries for their medical benefits, Chiffolo relates that they are high in vitamin C, calcium, iron, beta-carotene, and calories (vital after a long winter).

Their use in salads was included though the 17th century and would help authenticate the salad at your feast table.

Dandelions are easily identifiable and all parts of the plant are edible. Greens should be picked young, before the onset of flower buds. Flower petals make a wonderful visual addition to salad and baked goods.

If you are going to pick the greens, make sure it is in an area free from pesticides and wash them thoroughly before consuming.

You can grow dandelion from seed, but leaving a patch of unmoved lawn seems the easier option.

The want to bring the middle ages to life in immersive detail is something most of us strive for. However, scant archeological records, limited first hand documentation, and the changing meaning of words has made that difficult. This is especially true in the realm of cooking, where today's carrot is not the same as the carrot enjoyed in the 14th century.

Even when authentic ingredients or their near relatives can be found, they might be prohibitively expensive. There is one source, often overlooked, that can give us authentic, widely used ingredients for the cost of some physical labor.

Wild edibles are in abundance, if you know where and when to look. Many herbs- even a continent away- are so similar to their European (or Asian) counterparts that it is worth the search and harvest. This article will focus on spring edibles found in the Shire of Glenn Linn and around the world.

Spring is a joyous time, but often a hungry one. Food stores have been depleted, and gardens are only turned and planted with what hardy seeds can survive a late frost. It was probably with great excitement that people plucked up the fresh greens of spring after months of their absence from their diet.

Wild leeks or ramps:

Wild leeks in this country are not the same variety found in Europe, but are similar in both taste and appearance and make a much better addition to medieval cuisine than



cultivated leeks.

Wild leeks have a taste between mild garlic and sweet onion and usually grow in the filtered shade of the woods, especially near stream banks. Once you uproot a wild leek, it will be obvious by the garlic-like aroma emanating from the plant. Plants are harvestable between April and May.

This plant is something of a rarity and currently in high demand. Always ask permission before harvesting on property that does not belong to you. Harvest sustainably by taking only one of the two leaves present on the plant and allowing the bulb to stay in the ground. If you find a large patch, you can harvest entire plants, but only take what you will use.

Ramp seeds can be found for purchase, but are difficult to grow.

Ramps can be eaten raw or cooked but should be thoroughly washed before consumption.

RECIPE: Ramp Butter

Take freshly harvested ramps and wash them (four or five leaves to one half cup of butter works well). Blanche them for thirty seconds and set aside to cool. Pat them with a towel to remove as much moisture as possible, Mince the leaves and combine with softened butter. Roll butter into logs, wrap in parchment paper and then foil. Freeze until needed.

Heise tells us that mint was used in the middle ages, as it is often used now, for stomach problems, as well as fevers and wounds. Made into a vinegar, it was used as a mouthwash and a sauce made of mint was thought to restore the appetite. It is a favorite for inclusion in sauces and added to dishes both sweet and savory.

Mint can be harvested at anytime, but is easiest to spot in late spring and early summer.

You can grow this plant in your garden, but it is highly invasive and is best kept in an isolated location. I find the wild version to be more flavorful and abundant enough not to have to devote time and space to growing it.

Nettle: Stinging nettle or 'seven minute itch' is a wonder plant that provides significant amounts of iron, vitamin k, manganese, and other nutrients. Often, we see this plant as a nuisance whose hair-like fibers give a short-lived burning rash, but it was a multi-use pant in the middle ages.

Nettle soup was a common addition to the table and a favorite of St. Columba in Ireland. Later in the season, it was made into string

Take parsel, sawge, garlec, chybollus, oynons, lek, borage, myntes, porrettes, fenels and towne cressis, rewe, rosmarye, purslary, lauen and waische hem clene pyke hem pluk hem small with thyne hond and mynge hem wel with rawe oyle. lay on vyneger and salt and surve hem forth.

Translation:

Take parsley, sage, garlic, chives, onions, leek, borage, mint, scallions, fennel, garden cress, rue, rosemary, purslane, rinse and wash them clean, pick them pluck them small with thine hand and mix them well with raw oil. Lay on vinegar and salt and serve them forth.



Mint: Mint is a plant known to much of the world and your spice cupboard. According to Elpel, rosemary, sage, and thyme, along with several other herbs, are members of the mint family. The flavor of wild mint is a far cry from the artificial flavoring many of us are used to. There are several varieties of mint, but, they all have a square stem and opposite leaves (directly across from one another on the stem). You will be

able to tell wild mint by the familiar scent of its crushed leaves.

and even woven into cloth.

Harvest young tops early in the season, as later they become inedible. You can wear gloves to avoid the sting, or grasp the plant firmly, crushing the filaments before they can enter your skin.

If you can't find this plant near you, seeds are available.

RECIPE: Rich Nettle Broth (courtesy of Wytrig.com)

- 1 cup, packed down, of young, freshly picked tops of nettles (don't use nettle that has begun to flower or set seed*)
- 2 cups chicken broth or vegetable stock



- 2 oz butter (50gm)
- 1/2 cup uncooked oatmeal, or one medium potato cooked and diced
- 4 TBS sour cream
- Salt and pepper to taste

1. Wearing gloves, pick tender top growth of nettles
2. Still wearing gloves, wash nettle tops, then coarsely chop
3. Melt butter in sauce pan; add nettles and heat gently until wilted
4. Add the stock and bring to low boil
5. Turn down the heat , add oatmeal pr potato; simmer for 10-15 minutes
6. Puree in blender and sieve topped with sour cream, swirled gently to make a spiral

**Soaking nettles in water or cooking them will remove the stinging chemicals from the plant. Nettles should be eaten only when young and green, as once it begins blooming and setting seed, its leaves develop tiny, gritty particles of calcium carbonate called cystoliths, and these can cause urinary tract irritation.*

Wild Strawberries: As a child I had a spot where I would gather these every year. If you find one, guard it well, for the berries are a favorite of wild creatures as well as people. These tiny berries look just like their store bought counterparts, but much smaller. Their taste, however, is something to experience, as the tiny fruit will fill your mouth with flavor. Look for the tell tale three leaved plants set on runners along with their white flowers in late spring. Fruit sets in early June just as spring wanes.



According to Abbeymedievalfestival.com, the strawberry was met with mixed reviews in medieval Europe being both praised as a fruit of perfection associated with the Virgin Mary and a plant to be avoided as it grew on the ground where serpents might pass by.

The Norse had more love for the plant, connecting it to both the goddess Frigga and Freyja. The website abbeymedievalfestival.com relates a tender reverence for a fruit so small, yet intensely flavorful: "In Norse mythology Frigga gave strawberries as a symbol to the spirits of young children who had died in infancy who would then ascend to heaven hidden within a strawberry."

This is not something that you will be able to gather in sufficient quantities for the feast table, but a small bowl of them

for your most honored guests would be a luxury well remembered.

You can grow alpine strawberries in your garden, the taste is similar, but the berries are larger. As with the wild variety, berries should be picked as close to consumption as possible.

SPECIAL NOTE: Before foraging for wild foods, consult field guides or take a class to help determine that you have plants properly identified.

The Founding of the Shire of Glenn Linn

In 1988, the twenty-second year of the Society for Creative Anachronisms, a handful of gamers, history buffs and Sci-Fi fans in North Eastern New York decided to join the dream. The inspiration came from a friend and former resident of the area who still had connections with the local gamers and had several years of experience in the society through involvement with the Barony of Concordia of the Snows, and it's Canton of Brewers Keep (now defunct). At the time, Glens Falls, Queensbury and the surrounding towns lay in a large, mostly unclaimed area between what is now the Central and Northern Regions of the East Kingdom. While years earlier, an incipient shire called Galagalen had briefly staked claim to the lands around nearby Lake George, it had become defunct and was long forgotten. Because of this, there was no local SCA activity, so interested individuals would have to travel almost an hour at the very least, and often much further in order to participate.

Trips to events in Vermont (Mountain Freehold), Massachusetts (Bergental), and the relatively nearby Barony of Concordia (Schenectady NY) were undertaken as were visits to Brewers Keep in Albany for fighter practices and soon a remedy for the necessity of travel was decided upon by trying to bring an event to Glens Falls. By approaching the Glens Falls Common Council, backing was gained to hold an event in the park outside of Crandall Library and the Canton of Brewers Keep was approached and agreed to sponsor the event. The result being that the East Kingdoms Fall Crown Tourney for 1988 was held in the center of Glens Falls. This event, which garnered a lot of attention, was well advertised (the local Post-Star newspaper even ran an Arts Section cover story promoting the upcoming event), open to the public and included an "information booth" to provide more details about the society, jump started the process to form a local Shire.

The turn out for this event and increased public interest lead to an informational meeting being held in Crandall Public Library the next month to provide information to those individuals who wished to join the "Not Yet Incipient Shire of Glenn Linn". A large turnout of interested parties spoke well for the need of a local SCA presence in and around Glens Falls. After the November meeting, the soon-to-be Shire was off and running. The core group of local gamers were joined by a few transplants from the Canton of Brewers Keep and several more dedicated individuals from the informational meeting, in working toward the goal of full status within the Society.

Officers were soon elected, a news letter published, and the appropriate paperwork was filed with the Society. Soon, many activities were planned and executed. Arts and Sciences along with combative skills all flourished in those early days, with single day and even weekend campouts on various A&S themes being held. Heavy list combat, fencing and even archery practices occurred from the very beginning of the Shire with the archery program itself getting off the ground with a gift of equipment from HRH Prince Morghun in Jan of 1989. In addition, the Shire also held its first official events, Rattan Rally and Romp In The Park, both of which were very successful with Romp occurring many more times in years to come.

In February of 1989 the Shire was first listed in the Kingdom news letter (The Pikestaff). In May of 1989, the new Shires name, Glenn Linn became officially registered and the device representing a river running through a green valley was officially accepted in October of the same year. In April of 1990, the Shire left its incipient status and became a fully recognized group in the SCA. From then until now the Shire has been proud to be home to over one hundred members who have been recognized for merit over eighty times by the Kingdom. We have also put on numerous demonstrations throughout the local community, and run more than sixty events in service to the Society and to benefit its members.

Seneschal's Report: Tomas would like to open business meetings with the Song of the East Kingdom.

A reminder that when we are on unofficial web pages, those are for unofficial things. Nothing is official without seneschal approval.

Be kind and courteous to one another. Officers, part of your duty is to stop unchivalrous behavior. Let us try and eliminate the politics to the best of our ability.

When we have conversations at business meetings, please direct comments to those who have the floor.

Birka Report (Given by Tomas)

While at Birka, Tomas attended the East Kingdom Finances meeting.

Tomas gave a Birka merchant list to Hrotgar (in preparation for the Great Northern Thing), and a Birka pamphlet was passed around to table. After speaking to the merchants, most said they would. Not be able to attend the Great Northern Thyng.

Social media officer is a new post for the kingdom, but unofficial for now.

EK finances- Pennsic funding from the East Kingdom used to be \$14,000, it is now \$8,000. It is not felt that the crown is overspending, however, the Kingdom Exchequer does not have to provide a report, so an accountant will be reviewing account statements.

The East Kingdom web minister suggested using Quick Books so that all exchequers have access to the information.

At an East Kingdom event, the kingdom splits the profits 50/50 with the event host. At a Royal Progress event, the kingdom gets 20% of the profit.

We have a new East Kingdom Exchequer. There are bills that need paying and there is a question as to where that money will come from.

Currently, the Kingdom provides travel, lodging, crowns, gate

costs, etc for the royalty. Only six events make substantial money for the crown. One of these is Birka which nest the kingdom \$4,000.

In 2018, 50% of groups reported a loss, one of them being Glenn Linn as we held no event that year.

2012 was the last year in which the kingdom posted a profit, and no one is certain of the exact size of the population for the East Kingdom.

Since money comes from events, it has been a the kingdom's prerogative to host as many events as possible and allowing only one championship per event. For example, EK 50 held the equestrian championship.

It was suggested that a professional handle money for the royals.

Transparency and communication area focus for the new exchequer, as well as an overhaul of the exchequer manual.

No changes will be made to policy until January 2020.

Exchequer Report: Balance is \$9,169.21 The revised budget was sent by Arnliof. Our 2018 budget was \$3,602.22 and we spent over \$1,700. Our 2019 budget is over \$10,000

Budget report accepted.

Web Minister Report: Our officer pics went missing, so no new photos are up.

Google forum to email will be our official discussion page. Each officer has a private calendar in which they can access and post things which will in turn change the calendar seen on the Glenn Linn website.

East Kingdom Web Minister was consulted as to issues with the Glenn Linn page setting off security systems on some browsers.

Herald Report: Manuscripts are being looked at to help member with research for name.



Letter of intent sent to group seneschal.

Knight Marshal Report: Looking to expand some loaner gear, has some materials for repair/ creation of armor. Working on memorizing the new handbook.

Youth Marshal Report: Still in limbo with paperwork. Calibration is going up for the older youth to combat loss of interest in the sport.

Rapier Marshal Report: We have no official rapier marshal, but someone is working on becoming one.

Siege Weapons Marshal Report: We don't currently have a siege weapons marshal, but for those interested, it takes five siege events in a colander year to become a marshal. Pennis has many and so one could earn marshal status entirely at that event. A siege marshal is only needed for siege weapons used in combat situations, not for firing of siege weapons in general.

Archery Marshals Report: Only half of the practices available were actually held at the Argyle site. No one from the community came last year (thought they had in previous years) Many of the archery practices could not be held because the archery marshal was not present.

Insurance questions still linger for the Argyle site, and we don't know if we will be utilizing it this year.

Other places to practice include West Mountain (unsure about storage), the Fish and Game Club, the Warrington Country Sheriff's shooting range in Warrensburg (no storage available), and the Maloney property (free and storage available). The Monrau State Park is also a suggestion which features hiking trails.

Minister of the List Report: Letter of intent sent to Tomas.

Chatelaine report: We had a meeting last month with Janice, director of the Historic Salaem Courthouse Community Center in Salem, NY. We toured the facilities, which includes a commercial kitchen that can fit up to fifteen people, a performance space, some side room, a pottery studio, outdoor space, and a barn capable of holding over 100 people.

The Lunch, Learn, and Play program was discussed and we offered a weeks worth of classes to the program between mid July and Early August.

A program outline was written out and sent to the appropriate people.

A medieval cooking class and or brewing llass was also discussed with great interest from both parites.

The Salem demo needs a firm dates that we can move for-

ward. At last check, the library was open every weekend in March with the exception of the 16th and the 30th. Proposed dates were the 23rd and the 24th.

The demo will run as a series of five minute talks with hands on displays available. I can have pamphlets ready, but will need help with items for display.

We can offers one light medieval refreshments.

We are also doing a demo for the Lights on Learning program on Sunday, May 19 from 1-2:30

Mistress of Arts and Sciences Report: We are still searching for a site to have classes. Most churches require someone to be a member.

The Moreau community center has no cost, but it is harder to get there in the winter for some members.

The Crandall Library- we can use it 24 times year, but only six of those can be in the community room. During the summer, no Sundays are available at the library, but somethings could be done outside. The library wouldn't mind sponsoring some of our events as they love educational activities.

West Mountain Ski Area is another site we might be able to use, but we have no information on cost, insurance, etc.

Chronicler's Report: Paper work is in and Ullach is waiting to hear back from Kingdom. Ullach is interested in soliciting stories about Glenn Linn from people in surrounding shires via facebook. If anyone in the shier has stories they would like to share, please email them to Ullach by March 1st. Any and all memories are needed.

Old Business

- We could build up fighting by focusing more on the boffer competitions at the teen center.

- Fund raiser for the Great Northern Thyng- Teeshirts and mugs. If we go through T-Spring, we get all the profit. Will has offered to help make some things by hand in his kiln.

- We have only one event a year, last year there was no event because of EK 50. This year we will have The Great Northern Thyng.

- Girl Scout Event - we are assisting. Sean is teaching story telling and Tomas is teaching archery.

- Great Northern Thyng prizes are being worked on.

- The Moreau community center will be the site of our craft day on March 31st. Please contact Sandi with your info.

New Business

- Headway is being made into underrepresented areas of the shire.

- Several libraries and community centers should be contacted where we can hold demos and meetings including (but not lim-

Seneschal Report: Tomas is going to Birka to talk up the Great Northern Thyng.

One letter has been received by officers.

All incoming officers need to submit their modern name, address, email, and phone number along with their SCA name, membership number and expiration date.

A permanent location is still being scouted to hold meetings and A&S classes. Tomas is in talks with Christ the King United Methodist Church, but a sponsor from the church might be necessary. In the past (distant past) there was an event held at Christ the King in which a member pushed for mead to be available. This was seen unfavorably by the church and is still remembered today. If someone has an idea for a place to hold meetings and classes, stay organized through Tomas and Sandi.

We need to expand so we can get greater numbers in the shire and we can accomplish more.

Salem area and others could be designated 'hamlets' (not an official SCA designation). These places can have 'local' A&S nights or practices. The Mistress of Arts and Sciences does not have to be present, she just needs a report before and after each class.

We are also looking to expand into equestrian. We have made contact with a woman who is interested.

Exchequer Report: Arnleif has sent in her last exchequer report. No business has been done this month. The balance stands at \$9,169.21.

There are a few pieces of paper work for the seneschal to sign. The exchequer is actively seeking a deputy.

Herald's Report: Looking into an inquiry made for clarification

on naming procedures and source material.

Current herald is interested only being a book herald. It was suggested that children could be trained to do voice heraldry duty and give them something to do. It was suggested that children should not be announcing more than simple requests and statements and other voice herald duties require more finesse.

Arts and Sciences Report: December 2nd, there was no class as we had no location and people were busy with the holidays. On December 6th, there was no location and with the Mistress of Arts and Sciences injured, the class was cancelled.

Classes are still being added to to calendar for the event. The MoAS requires contact information for the teacher, age requirements for participants, cost of materials needed, whether the class is considered 'clean' or 'dirty' and first and second choice of days wanted for the class. She would also like to know if special accommodations are needed such as electricity, etc. She also needs to know which spaces/services are available at the event site.

It was suggested that people give the seneschal a list of talents and organizations they belong to so that this might be best exploited for the benefit of the group. For instance, if someone is a member of a certain church, that person could be called up to head up negotiations on that space.

Knight Marshal Report: The Knight marshal would like to hold a boffer tournament in the community room of the library as a way to ease the site into use for heavy fighters. (East Greenbush uses their library community room for fight practice). Outside the Glens Falls library is available for heavy use.



Chronicler's Report: The letter intended for the kingdom chronicler (their deputy and the regional chronicler) and is awaiting the seneschal's letter to accompany them. Since only the kingdom can sanction me as a chronicler, I cannot call myself such until I have kingdom approval. I will still work on our newsletter.

The December issue of The Cascadian is out! Now we must begin recruiting stories and memories for the March issue, which will celebrate Glenn Linn's thirtieth anniversary! Please have all of your memories, stories, photos, etc. of the shire in to me NO LATER than March first. I am aiming for a March 15th pub date.

Chatelaine's Report: A meeting was held with Susan Getty at the Bancroft Salem Library. There are several days open for use of Proudfit Hall, a community room to the library including the following weekends: Saturday February 9, Saturday February 23, and all Sundays in February. Every weekend in March, with the exception of the 16th and the 30th.

Susan said if the library is allowed to bill it as a library event, she will be able to distribute our flyer, advertise on the library facebook and place, the demo in the local paper.

We are asked to come back and help with the summer program. They have an outdoor space suitable for a fighting demonstration. This would be a great place for regional arts and sciences nights, if we can keep ourselves in good standing with them. There are many long tables and even a small kitchen. There is no cost to use the hall, but a helpful relationship and/or a small donation would be in order if we continue to rely on the space.

There has also been communication with the people in charge of the Historic Salem Courthouse. They would like to meet with us next week. They have a commercial kitchen and a performance space. These things are not free but entail a yearly \$100 membership plus a kitchen fee that is \$25/hour for the first two hours and \$15 after that. They do run cooking classes and we would be allowed to run our own medieval cooking classes and it could be a unique way to recruit new members. It could also help to offset the cost of our membership and fees. Beyond that, they run a summer program called Laugh, Learn, and Play for the community children. They are incredibly interested in our involvement. It would be beneficial to us to volunteer our services as help create buzz in the area.

A reminder that there is a demo planned in May for the Lights on Learning program in Cambridge, NY.

Considering the interest generated by the minor outreach done in Salem, growth is anticipated in the area. With archery practice already established in Argyle, and members in Salem able to foster newer members, the chatelaine is hoping for a high retention rate of said new members.

Gold key- As the weather warms, there are plans to go to the

shire storage shed located in Greenwich and catalogue the loaner garb and feast gear. This was done a couple of years ago, but I garb should be organized, repaired, and replaced before the Great Northern Thyng, as the event will be open to the public on the last day.

Minister of the Lists Report: Nothing to report.

Archery Marshal Report: The archery program needs more membership. At one time there were twelve people submitting archery scores, now there are none.

We could put notices in the Stewart's shop in Argyle advertising the Argyle archery shoot.

We can also use the county firing range in Warrensburg. There are trails so we could do trial shoots.

Last year Argyle said we could shoot on the current archery site, but there was a question about insurance. It is unclear if we will be able to continue using that site.

West Mountain might be available between May and October as a shooting venue.

Hudson Falls fish and Game Club has a 20 yard indoor range. Outdoor is any distance. There are no insurance problems, as long as Tomas is on site as he is a member of the Fish and Game club.

New Business: Beautiful scrolls were made for some of the youth competitions at The Great Northern Thyng. The youth at the meeting agreed they were beautiful.
